SAFETY MESSAGE

Space heaters and electric blankets can be efficient ways to stay warm, but they can also be dangerous. We encourage you to understand the dangers of heating devices before you use them.

- Check space heaters and electric blankets before use. Cords should not be frayed, brittle, or cracked. The blanket should not have any charred or dark areas.
- Turn space heaters and electric blankets off when not in use.
- Space heaters should be kept at least 3 feet from blankets, clothing, paper, and other flammables.



How Cold Winter Weather Impacts Your Energy Bill

Although we can't control the frigid weather, we can control our energy habits. The colder the weather is outside, the harder your home heating system needs to work in order to keep your home at the temperature on your thermostat.

We recommend keeping your thermostat at 68 degrees or lower during winter months to save on home heating costs.



CHICKEN ENCHILADA SOUP

INGREDIENTS

- 15 oz can black beans, rinsed and drained
- 14.5 oz can diced tomatoes
- 10 oz package frozen whole kernel corn
- ½ c chopped onion
- ½ c chopped bell pepper
 10 oz can enchilada sauce
- 10.75 oz can condensed cream of chicken soup

PREP TIME - 15 MINS COOK TIME - 6-8 HOURS

- 1½ c milk
- 1 c shredded pepper jack cheese
- 2 chicken breasts

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. In a slow cooker, combine drained beans, tomatoes, corn, onion, and bell pepper. Place the chicken breasts on top of the mixture.
- 2. In a large bowl, whisk together enchilada sauce and soup. Gradually whisk in milk until smooth. Pour sauce mixture over ingredients in slow cooker.
- 3. Cover and cook on low for 6 to 8 hours or on high for 3 to 4 hours.
- 4. Remove the chicken and shred it into bite-sized pieces. Add chicken back into soup.
- 5. Top with pepper jack cheese and serve.



2024 RELIABILITY REPORT

Our members had power 99.998477% of the time last year.

We conducted 1,088 planned outages. Planned outages are crucial to ensure our crews can work safely while maintaining our lines, equipment and building new projects.



Weather continues to be the leading cause of power outages, resulting in 352 outages in 2024. Our biggest weather event occured in April, with lots of heavy, wet snow and ice. The second busiest month for crews related to weather outages was in May when we experienced strong winds and heavy rain, resulting in downed trees on power lines.

The average outage time was 3 hours and 57 minutes. We do our best to minimize the time our members are without power, and we appreciate your patience and understanding as our crews work to safely restore your power.

SUPPORT THE RIGHT OF FIRST REFUSAL BILL ASSEMBLY BILL 470 SENATE BILL 481

Not only would jobs stay local, but allowing existing transmission companies to build new projects in our service area ensures we have more control over our electric grid.

"As a member of my electric cooperative and your constituent, please support the Right of First Refusal (ROFR) legislation. When my electric co-op's transmission provider is a project partner, I benefit from their participation. Investment returns will be shared with my not-for-profit co-op to keep my electric rates lower when transmission lines are built."
